LATE MRS. PAULSON ONE OF FEW SURVIVORS

Three Brothers Were Killed and One Wounded By Indians In 1862.

20, brought to mind the awful days in August in 1862 when a mardorous band of Stong Indiana whose last for blines and least had been let house by the great managers along the Minne sota river three days before, came to the outlying western settlements of Monungalia county and murdered thurteen men, women and children in the peaceable West Lake settlement The settlers there had altended swed ish Lutherun services at the Lunherz cable in which the late Mrs Paulian: was a fourteen rear old girl at the time. Her three brothers Anders Pet ter, aged 25, tiustat, aged 25," and lark aged" 22; were all killed by the Indiana, and her bruher Samuel, aged eleven was severely wounded Two firoborg families lived about two nuice west of the Landberg cabin, While the services spoken of were on at the Paulson cable one of the tire berg children came running and told that the Indians bad come to the line berg cabins and were acting manghix The Landburg burn run there first and were taken off their guard and killed by the indians who later met the elder people coming by ox team from the mosting and massacred them on the read The two families of A P. Broberg and Daniel Broberg were nearly entirely wiped out, there remaining only one child of each, who had narrow escapes The story of these stirring times is fully recorded in the History of Kandirohi County, published and sold by The Tribune Printing Company, Mrs. Paulson carried the memory of this frightful massacre very vividly, and always was ready to tell of it to visitors,
